History/Geography

The children will be looking into the history of the Ancient Mayan Civilisation to investigate where the Mayans lived, when the Mayan ruins were discovered, what Mesoamerica is like. how the society was organised, what they believed, what everyday life was like for the Mayans, what they achieved and why their civilisation declined.

History skills: Use sources of evidence to deduce information about the past. Understand that no single source of evidence gives the full answer to questions about the past. Describe the characteristic features of the past, including ideas, beliefs, attitudes and experiences of men, women and children. Describe the social, ethnic, cultural or religious diversity of past society. Use dates and terms accurately when describing events. Use appropriate historical vocabulary to communicate. Geography Skills: Name and locate some of the countries and cities of the world and their identifying human and physical characteristics. Name and locate the countries of South America and identify their main physical and human characteristics. Identify and describe how the physical features affect the human activity within a location. Describe how locations around the world are changing and explain some of the reasons for change. Describe and understand key aspects of physical and human geography. Create maps of locations identifying patterns.

This half-term, we will be studying a unit entitled 'The Influence of Faith on Believers. The children will be exploring the ways in which religion and faith impact on people's lives. They will also look at the impact of faith on whole communities. The children will explore and research the reasons why people belong to religions.
