Privacy Notice (How we use pupil information)

The categories of pupil information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Contact details, contact preferences, date of birth, identification documents
- Results of internal assessments and externally set tests
- Pupil and curricular records
- Characteristics, such as ethnic background, eligibility for free school meals, or special educational needs
- Exclusion information
- Details of any medical conditions, including physical and mental health
- Attendance information
- Safeguarding information
- Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- Photographs
- CCTV images captured in school

Why we collect and use this information

We use the pupil data:

- to support pupil learning
- to monitor and report on pupil progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to assess the quality of our services
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We only collect and use pupils' personal data when the law allows us to. Most commonly, we process it where:

- We need to comply with a legal obligation
- We need it to perform an official task in the public interest

Less commonly, we may also process pupils' personal data in situations where:

- We have obtained consent to use it in a certain way (for example the use of pupil photographs in a display or on the website).
- We need to protect the individual's vital interests (or someone else's interests) Where we have obtained consent to use pupils' personal data, this consent can be

withdrawn at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for consent, and explain how consent can be withdrawn.

We collect and use pupil information under Article 6 and Article 9 of the General Data Protection Regulation.

- As set out in Article 6, the lawful basis for the majority of the data that we collect and process is to carry out a Public Task which is the provision of a state-funded education.
- The lawful basis for processing Special Category Data is that this processing is necessary for reasons of substantial public interest (as set out in Article 9). For example, we must complete a termly Department for Education Census as set out in the Education Act 1996.

Collecting pupil information

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing pupil data

We hold both electronic and paper pupil data. Electronic data held is password protected and paper data is held in secured containers within school. These will always be sent to the school in which they are transferring. Electronic data is transferred on a secure site provided by the DfE and paper data will always be sent by registered post.

In line with the recommendations made in the 'Information Management Toolkit for Schools (1st February 2016) we use the following retention periods for Pupil Records:

- Pupil Education Records are kept for the length of time that the child remains at the school. The files follow the pupil when he/she leaves our school to attend another primary school or to transfer to secondary school. If the pupil transfers to home schooling or leaves the country, the file will be returned to the the Local Authority for the statutory retention period
- Child Protection information is kept securely for 25 years after the child's date of birth. The main copy of this will be found in the Local Authority Social Services record.
- For all other types of data, the school uses the Retention Guidelines found in the 'Information Management Toolkit for Schools' which can be found at www.irms.org.uk.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- Our local authority to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- The Department for Education
- The pupil's family and representatives
- · Educators and examining bodies
- Our regulator Ofsted
- Suppliers and service providers to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Financial organisations
- · Central and local government
- Our auditors
- Survey and research organisations

- Health authorities
- Security organisations
- · Health and social welfare organisations
- Professional advisers and consultants
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Police forces, courts, tribunals
- Professional bodies

Why we share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our pupils with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

Data collection requirements:

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics

• providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact our school business manager.

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
